Legislators can make a big difference for animals with their votes—but they need to hear from you on animal protection issues.

**T**HE HUMANE SOCIETY LEGISLATIVE FUND publishes an annual *Humane Scorecard* to measure the support of federal legislators for a broad range of animal protection issues. For the 110th Congress (2007–2008), this preview *Scorecard* provides an easy way for constituents to assess how their U.S. senators and representatives acted on these issues, and it helps chart the progress of our public policy work on behalf of animals. The final printed scorecard will be published in the next few months after the 110th Congress has adjourned.

We hope you'll study this scorecard and use it as a tool to ensure that your legislators are representing your interests. Let them know that you're watching and you appreciate their support for pro-animal legislation. Or, if they haven't done enough, let them know you'd like to see them do more.

HSLF acknowledges the inherent limitations of judging a legislator on the basis of a few select votes, cosponsorships, and joint letters. In some cases, legislators must miss votes for unavoidable reasons, such as a death in the family, serious illness, or birth of a child. Please also consider such unrecorded matters as performance on committees and constituent service.

# SENATE Scored Items

## Horse Slaughter—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored S. 311—introduced by Sens. Landrieu (D-La.) and Ensign (R-Nev.)—to bar the transport, possession, purchase, and sale of horses to be slaughtered for human consumption. The Senate Commerce Committee passed this bill April 25, 2007, and as of press time, it had 39 cosponsors.

## Downed Animals—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored S. 394—introduced by Sen. Akaka (D-Hawaii)—to require humane euthanasia of livestock too sick or injured to walk and to prohibit USDA certification of meat from such animals for human consumption, or S. 2770—introduced by Sen. Feinstein (D-Calif.)—to ban the slaughter of downed livestock and strengthen penalties for violations of the downer ban and humane slaughter law. In the aftermath of undercover HSUS investigations that prompted the largest meat recall in U.S. history, two Senate hearings led by Sen. Kohl (D-Wis.) addressed issues associated with downed animals and food safety. In August, the USDA proposed closing a loophole in its regulations that allows some downed cattle to be slaughtered for food. A provision to ban the slaughter of downed cattle and strengthen penalties was included by Sens. Kohl and Byrd (D-W.Va.) in an economic stimulus package, S. 3604, but debate on the overall package was blocked in the full Senate by a 52-42 vote (60 needed to proceed) on Sept. 27. S. 394 had 27 cosponsors and S. 2770 had 10 cosponsors.

## Class B Dealers—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored S. 714—introduced by Sen. Akaka (D-Hawaii)—to prohibit the use in research of dogs and cats obtained by Class B dealers through random sources, which can include theft of family pets and fraudulent response to “free to good home” ads. Parallel legislation was approved in both the House and Senate Farm Bills but dropped in conference. S. 714 had 20 cosponsors.

## Animal Fighting—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored S. 261—introduced by Sens. Cantwell (D-Wash.), Ensign (R-Nev.), Specter (R-Pa.), and Feinstein (D-Calif.) with key support from Judiciary Committee Chairman Leahy (D-Vt.)—to establish felony-level penalties for violations of the federal law on dogfighting, cockfighting, and other animal fighting ventures and to ban interstate and foreign commerce in cockfighting implements. The House companion bill, H.R. 137, was signed into law May 3, 2007. S. 261 had 47 cosponsors.

## Farm Bill—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted to override President Bush’s veto of H.R. 2419, which contains key animal welfare provisions to strengthen the federal law on animal fighting, prohibit importation of puppies under 6 months of age, and increase penalties for violations of the Animal Welfare Act. Although senators based their votes on a broad range of issues encompassed in the Farm Bill, HSLF supported the package and urged members to vote for it because of its major advances for animal protection. The Senate voted 82-13 to override the veto May 22 (Roll Call No. 140), and the bill was enacted as P.L. 110-234.

## Funding Letter

A ✓ indicates that the member signed a group letter—led by Sens. Levin (D-Mich.) and Dole (R-N.C.)—to the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee seeking funds for enforcement of the Humane Methods of Slaughter Act, Animal Welfare Act, and federal animal fighting law, as well as for programs to address the needs of animals in disasters and to ease a shortage of veterinarians in rural and inner-city areas and public health practice through student loan forgiveness. The letter was cosigned by 46 senators and sent March 20. Subcommittee and committee leaders—Sens. Kohl (D-Wis.), Bennett (R-Utah), Byrd (D-W.Va.), and Cochran (R-Miss.)—don’t sign letters to themselves but received *Scorecard* credit because they were responsive to these requests. Final action on the Agriculture Appropriations bill was deferred until March 2009, and a “continuing resolution” was signed into law Sept. 30 (P.L. 110-329) to keep the government operating at current funding levels until then.

## Leaders

A ✓ indicates that the member led as a prime sponsor of pro-animal legislation (including items not scored on this chart).

## A Note on the Scorecard

Many animal protection issues never receive a recorded vote in Congress. Some are enacted by voice vote, and some languish. To more accurately measure legislators’ support for the broad range of animal issues, we count cosponsorships of certain key bills along with recorded votes. Cosponsoring a bill is a meaningful way for legislators to help the bill advance in Congress. We also count those who signed letters seeking increased funding to implement and enforce key animal welfare laws, as this is a tangible way for legislators to help improve the lives of millions of animals. Scores are given as a percentage of the total number of items counted (six for the Senate). For example, a senator who was pro-animal on five of the six scored items received a score of 83. Members who led as prime sponsors of pro-animal legislation received “extra credit” equivalent to one vote or cosponsorship, unless they already had a score of 100—in which case, their scores appear in bold with a plus sign.

# HOUSE Scored Items

## Horse Slaughter—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored H.R. 503—introduced by Reps. Schakowsky (D-Ill.), Rahall (D-W.Va.), Whitfield (R-Ky.), and Spratt (D-S.C.)—or H.R. 6598—introduced by Reps. Conyers (D-Mich.) and Burton (R-Ind.)—to bar the transport, possession, purchase, or sale of horses to be slaughtered for human consumption. H.R. 503 had 207 cosponsors but was stalled in committee. H.R. 6598, introduced in July, had 122 cosponsors and was approved by the House Judiciary Committee on Sept. 23.

## Downed Animals—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored H.R. 661—introduced by Reps. Ackerman (D-N.Y.) and LaTourette (R-Ohio)—to require humane euthanasia of livestock too sick or injured to walk and prohibit USDA certification of meat from such animals for human consumption, or H.R. 5762—introduced by Rep. DeLauro (D-Conn.)—to ban the slaughter of downed livestock and require the release of the names of retailers and school districts that purchased meat, poultry, or egg products subject to recall. In the aftermath of undercover HSUS investigations that prompted the largest meat recall in U.S. history, six House hearings—led by Reps. DeLauro, Stupak (D-Mich.), Kucinich (D-Ohio), and George Miller (D-Calif.)—addressed issues associated with downed animals and food safety. In August, the USDA proposed closing a loophole in its regulations that allows some downed cattle to be slaughtered for food. H.R. 661 had 146 cosponsors and H.R. 5762 had 26 cosponsors.

## Class B Dealers—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored H.R. 1280—introduced by Reps. Doyle (D-Pa.) and English (R-Pa.)—to prohibit the use in research of dogs and cats obtained by Class B dealers through random sources, which can include theft of family pets and fraudulent response to “free to good home” ads. Parallel legislation was approved in both the House and Senate Farm Bills but dropped in conference. H.R. 1280 had 128 cosponsors.

## Fur Labeling—Cosponsor

A ✓ indicates that the member cosponsored H.R. 891—introduced by Reps. Moran (D-Va.) and Ferguson (R-N.J.)—to require labeling of all fur products regardless of value and include raccoon dogs in the current prohibition on interstate and foreign commerce in dog and cat fur products. Currently, a loophole allows fur products valued at \$150 or less to be sold in the U.S. without disclosure. H.R. 891 had 176 cosponsors.

## Animal Fighting—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of the Animal Fighting Prohibition Enforcement Act (H.R. 137)—introduced by Reps. Gallegly (R-Calif.), Blumenauer (D-Ore.), and Bartlett (R-Md.)—to establish felony-level penalties for violations of the federal law on dogfighting, cockfighting, and other animal fighting ventures and to ban interstate and foreign commerce in cockfighting implements. H.R. 137 passed by a 368-39 vote (Roll Call No. 188) March 26, 2007, cleared the Senate by unanimous voice vote April 10, 2007, and was signed into law May 3, 2007, as P.L. 110-22.

## Wild Horses—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of H.R. 249—introduced by Reps. Rahall (D-W.Va.) and Whitfield (R-Ky.)—to restore the prohibition on the commercial sale and slaughter of wild horses and burros. This protection had been revoked by a “rider” slipped into the fiscal 2005 omnibus spending bill. H.R. 249 passed the House by a 277-137 vote (Roll Call No. 269) on April 26, 2007.

## Polar Bears—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of an amendment—offered by Reps. Inslee (D-Wash.) and LoBiondo (R-N.J.)—to the fiscal 2008 Interior Appropriations bill (H.R. 2643) to bar federal funding that permits the import of sport-hunted polar bear trophies from Canada. Though the Senate passed its version of the Interior Bill with this amendment added by Sen. Reed (D-R.I.) in committee June 21, 2007, the House rejected the amendment by a 188-242 vote (Roll Call No. 573) on June 27, 2007, and it was dropped in the final bill. Freestanding legislation (S. 1406/H.R. 2327) to bar import of sport-hunted polar bear trophies was also introduced by Sens. Kerry (D-Mass.) and Snowe (R-Maine) and Reps. Inslee and LoBiondo. On May 15, the U.S. Department of the Interior decided that polar bears should be listed as a threatened species, with a resulting bar on further imports of sport-hunted polar bear trophies from Canada.

## Great Cats/Rare Canids—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of H.R. 1464—introduced by Rep. Udall (D-N.M.)—to assist conservation programs that protect rare dog and cat species outside North America and Europe such as jaguars, leopards, cheetahs, and African wild dogs. H.R. 1464 passed the House by a 294-119 vote (Roll Call No. 335) on May 20 and was approved by Senate committee on Sept. 17 but did not get a vote in the full Senate.



# HOUSE Scored Items

## Crane Conservation—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of H.R. 1771—introduced by Rep. Baldwin (D-Wis.)—to provide assistance to conservation programs aimed at helping imperiled crane populations in this country and around the world. H.R. 1771 passed the House by a 304-118 vote (Roll Call No. 345) on May 21 and was approved by Senate committee on Sept. 17 but did not get a vote in the full Senate.

## Farm Bill—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted to override President Bush's veto of H.R. 2419, which contains key animal welfare provisions to strengthen the federal law on animal fighting, prohibit importation of puppies under 6 months of age, and increase penalties for violations of the Animal Welfare Act. Although representatives based their votes on a broad range of issues encompassed in the Farm Bill, HSLF supported the package and urged members to vote for it because of its major advances for animal protection. The House voted 316-108 to override the veto on May 21 (Roll Call No. 346), and the bill was enacted as P.L. 110-234.

## Primates as Pets—Vote

A ✓ indicates that the member voted in favor of H.R. 2964—introduced by Reps. E.B. Johnson (D-Texas) and Kirk (R-Ill.)—to prohibit interstate and foreign commerce in primates for the pet trade in order to protect public health and safety and prevent inhumane treatment and neglect of these animals. H.R. 2964 passed the House by a 302-96 vote (Roll Call No. 414) on June 17. The Senate companion bill, S. 1498—introduced by Sens. Boxer (D-Calif.) and Vitter (R-La.)—was approved in committee Oct. 29, 2007. Both S. 1498 and H.R. 2964 were blocked from full Senate consideration by a Senate hold.

## Funding Letter

A ✓ indicates that the member signed a group letter—led by Reps. Blumenauer (D-Ore.) and Smith (R-N.J.)—to the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee seeking funds for enforcement of the Humane Methods of Slaughter Act, Animal Welfare Act, and federal animal fighting law, as well as for programs to address the needs of animals in disasters and to ease a shortage of veterinarians in rural and inner-city areas and public health practice through student loan forgiveness. The letter was cosigned by 143 representatives and sent March 19. Subcommittee and committee leaders—Reps. DeLauro (D-Conn.), Kingston (R-Ga.),

Obey (D-Wis.), and Lewis (R-Calif.)—don't sign letters to themselves but received *Scorecard* credit because they were very responsive to these requests. Final action on the Agriculture Appropriations bill was deferred until March 2009, and a "continuing resolution" was signed into law Sept. 30 (P.L. 110-329) to keep the government operating at current funding levels until then.

## Leaders

A ✓ indicates that the member led as a prime sponsor of pro-animal legislation (including items not scored on this chart).

## A Note on the Scorecard

Scores are given as a percentage of the total number of items counted (12 for the House). For example, a representative who was pro-animal on 11 of the 12 scored items received a score of 92. Members who led as prime sponsors of pro-animal legislation received "extra credit" equivalent to one vote or cosponsorship, unless they already had a score of 100—in which case, their scores appear in bold with a plus sign.
